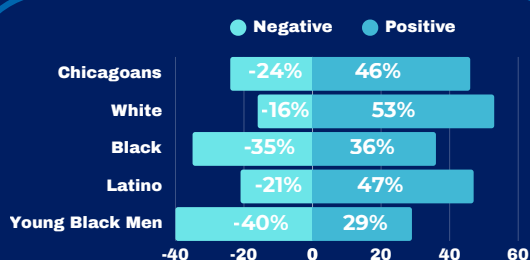
Summary of Findings

The Independent Monitoring Team (IMT) assesses the City of Chicago's compliance with the requirements of the Chicago Police Consent Decree. This summary describes the results of the IMT's second community survey of Chicago adults, which was conducted between October 2021 and May 2022 by researchers from the University of Illinois at Chicago and the University of Chicago.

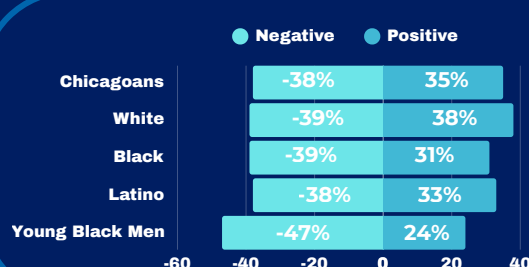
CHICAGOANS' PERCEPTIONS OF AND SATISFACTION WITH THE CPD IN 2022

Overall, Chicagoans' perceptions of and satisfaction with the Chicago Police Department (CPD) were more negative than in 2020. Young Black Men continued to rate the CPD more negatively than other Chicagoans on nearly all questions, including when compared to other Black Chicagoans.

Average Positive and Negative Ratings in 2020



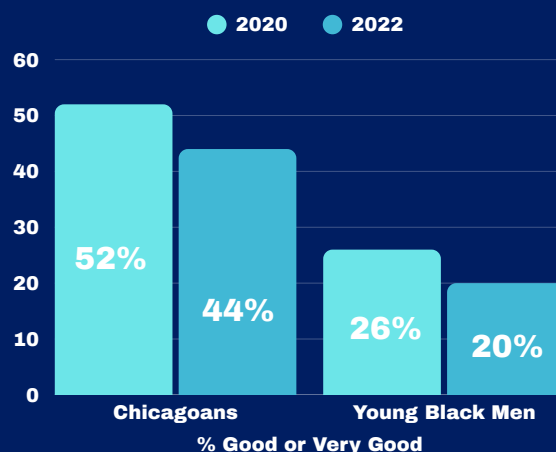
Average Positive and Negative Ratings in 2022



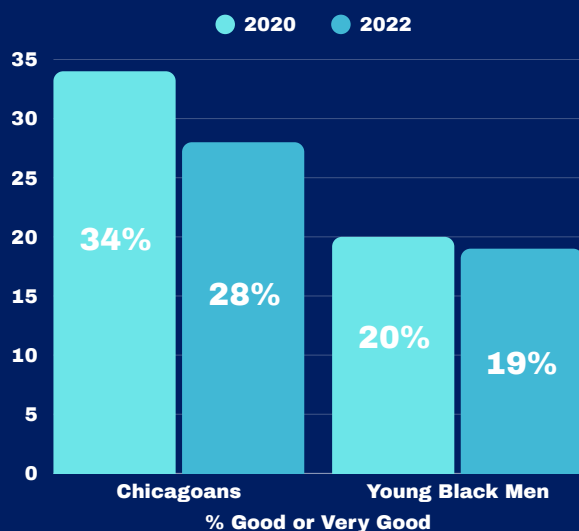
A MAJORITY OF CHICAGOANS RESPONDED POSITIVELY ON ONLY 11 OF THE 54 (20%) SURVEY QUESTIONS COMPARED TO 37% 2020

When compared to the 2020 survey results, a lower proportion of Chicagoans said the CPD was doing a "good" or "very good" job in both their neighborhood (see above figure) and citywide (see left figure).

EFFECTIVENESS

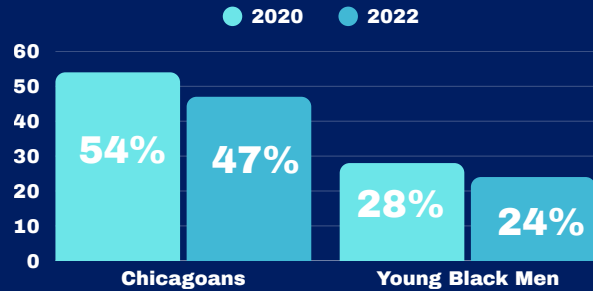
Chicagoans rated the CPD much less positively in 2022 than 2020

The proportion of those who gave “good” or “very good” responses dropped by at least 10% on five out of the seven Effectiveness questions.



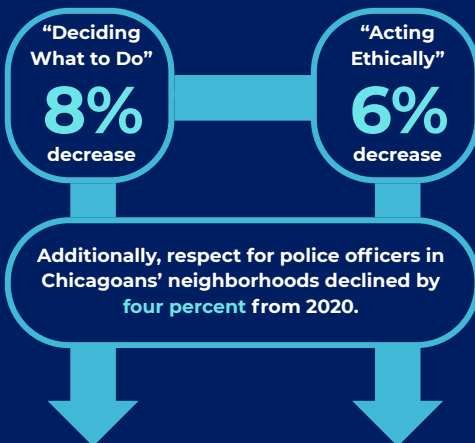
COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND RESPONSIVENESS

Less than half of Chicagoans felt that the relationship between the CPD and residents in their neighborhoods was “good” or “very good”. Young Black Men continue to rate the relationship much less positively than other Chicagoans.



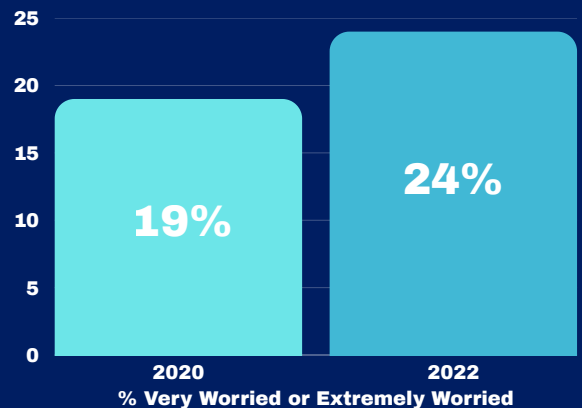
TRUSTWORTHINESS AND PROCEDURAL JUSTICE

Chicagoans in 2022 rated police less positively than in 2020 on considering the views of people involved when deciding “what to do” and “acting ethically”.



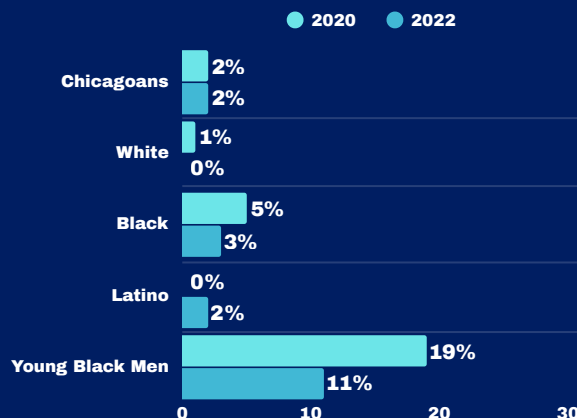
MISCONDUCT COMPLAINTS AND INVESTIGATIONS

In 2022, Chicagoans were more concerned about harassment as a result of making a complaint against the CPD than in 2020. The percentage who indicated they would be “very worried” or “extremely worried” about harassment or other consequences when making a complaint increased from 19% in 2020 to 24% in 2022.



INTERACTIONS - USE OF FORCE

Fewer Young Black Men reported having had a gun pointed at them by an officer in 2022 compared to 2020 (11% vs. 19%), but the rate was still much higher than the reported 2022 rates for Black, Latino, and White Chicagoans.



CONFIDENCE IN REFORM

Overall, more Chicagoans were “doubtful” or “very doubtful” that police reform would have a lasting and positive effect according to their responses in 2022 than in 2020
