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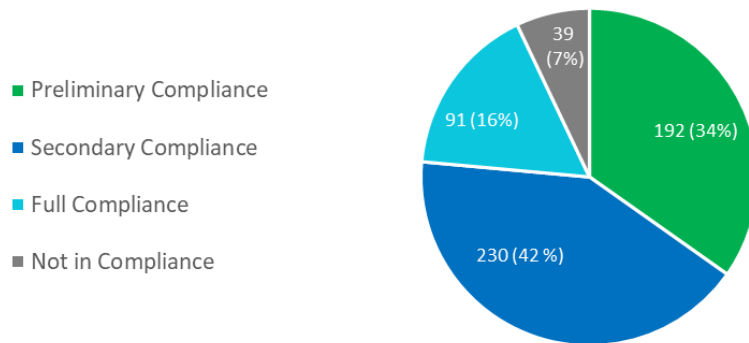
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Monitor Hickey Files *Independent Monitoring Report 11*, Urges City and CPD to Maintain Reform Momentum

CHICAGO – Independent Monitor Maggie Hickey filed [Independent Monitoring Report 11](#) with Judge Rebecca R. Pallmeyer in the U.S. District Court for the Northern District of Illinois. The report is an update to the Court and the public on the City of Chicago’s and the Chicago Police Department’s compliance progress through the eleventh reporting period (July 1, 2024, through December 31, 2024).

By December 31, 2024, the City of Chicago reached some level of compliance with about 92% of the original Consent Decree paragraphs: The City remains in Preliminary compliance with 192 paragraphs (about 34%), in Secondary compliance with 230 paragraphs (about 42%), and in Full compliance with 91 paragraphs (about 16%).

Monitor Hickey said, *“The City’s and the CPD’s compliance progress during this reporting period is the result of many years building the foundations necessary to demonstrate meaningful and sustainable reform. This includes significant investment in the infrastructure for policy and training development and delivery.”*

During this latest reporting period, the City and the CPD continue to build from these foundations with new and transparent efforts, including the CPD’s ongoing workforce allocation study. We are encouraged by the CPD’s demonstrations of compliance, particularly in the Use of Force section of the Consent Decree through meaningful updates to policies, trainings, and practices.

Monitor Hickey added, *“After years of effort, even more critical opportunities for improvement are now realistically within the CPD’s reach. This includes implementing a sustainable Community Engagement Plan across Chicago’s communities. It is our hope that this will also include consistent oversight of its traffic-stop policies and practices to ensure that they are promoting community and officer safety through transparent and reliable data collection.”*
